#### **USEF Lite**

Both Clemson and Asheville are sanctioned as Lite Shows with USEF. Anyone who signs the entry blank as a trainer must have a competing USEF membership and be Safe Sport trained. If you are an individual exhibitor or the parent of a youth who shows without a trainer, you will have to sign as the trainer and therefore must be a USEF member and take the Safe Sport training. We advise everyone to get memberships before arriving at the shows and make sure you are compliant in Safe Sport. Anyone who plans to show at the 2024 Nationals will have to have full competing memberships anyway, so if that includes you, it makes sense to get the membership before show season starts.

# Feature Farm HERITAGE FARM + STABLES CHARLIE & MILDA MINTER

Charlie Minter Jr grew up in the Paso Fino breed from the age of 10, when his father and grandfather purchased their first 3 Paso Finos from the LaHoods in Valdosta, GA, and brought them to NC. Charlie's parents, and his brother Mike, raised and trained under the name Caroline Farm and were instrumental in developing not only the breed in North Carolina, but also the precursor of Piedmont PFHA, which in those days was the Atlantic region. Charlie trained and showed all divisions. Training was a process of trial and error, since in those days of the 70's, there was little if any published information about Paso Finos or how they should be trained. There were also no amateur or youth classes, so everyone showed in open division classes.

Charlie went to NCSU where he met his future wife Milda when both were Animal Science Majors. Having been raised with mostly trotting horses, plus one gaited pony, and showing Saddlebreds as a teenager, Milda found Paso Finos to be a new adventure after Charlie introduced her to his family's herd. Charlie and Milda got married the summer before graduation, and after graduating in December of 1982, they moved in January 1983 to Agua Dulce, CA, to join the team at Rancho Paso Bravo, where Charlie's family had become ranch manager and trainers. They feel blessed to have worked with and help breed and train many Paso Finos which went on to become National and Grand National Champions, Top Ten Sires and Dams, and producers of more champion horses. In 1986 they became trainers for Sweet Water Paso Finos, where they stayed for 10 years in California and Texas, before moving home to Lexington, NC, to open their own business after nationals in 1996.

Heritage Farm & Stables is truly a family business. Charlie and Milda's daughters, Shannon, Christina, and Morgan, all competed heavily in youth classes in all divisions, winning a number of national and grand national championships combined. Other youth and amateur riders, in addition to their open level horses, have also had many successes in the show ring. Charlie and Milda still train and both were honored to be chosen as Trainers of the Year by the Professional Paso Fino Trainers Association. Christina also trains as a professional and starts most of the young horses under saddle. She was chosen as head coach of the 2018 PFHA Youth Mundial Team.

The training philosophy of the farm has always been that every horse has a best purpose, and it is their job to find and enhance it. To that end, the training goal is always to begin with a strong foundation of ground work and saddle training, and then see how each horse develops. Whether that horse turns out to be a champion show horse, a quiet trail horse, or anything in between, each horse is valued and finished for its own use and talents. The farm hosts a variety of events to enhance the knowledge of owners and the fun of ownership, such as training clinics, dressage clinics, open fun shows, mounted shooting clinics, trail horse clinics and tests, youth clinics, trail rides, demonstrations, and open houses, plus the open gaited show series which began in 2017. Lessons are offered for all ages and skill levels of riders, utilizing a string of retired show horses who demonstrate that Pasos can be gentle and safe enough even for beginners. In addition, Morgan and the homebred black stallion Canchero de Herencia have represented the Paso Fino breed as the Black Knight mascot for North Davidson High School, where Charlie and the girls attended high school, for the past 3 years. After over 50 years in the breed, the Minter Family continues to enjoy the farm life with their Paso Finos. They never tire of introducing new riders to the breed or helping owners reach their goals with their horses. They welcome visitors to the farm in Lexington, NC, any time of the year.



About 20 exhibitors made
